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## Categories of Articles

**Original Communications\***

Original research in clinical anatomy

**Compendium of Anatomical Variants\***

Approximately 500 word articles that: 1) describe a new anatomical variant; 2) provide new data on the frequency of specific anatomical variants; or 3) provide new information about an anatomical variant (e.g., functional, clinical information). Compendium articles may have no more than two authors (others may be acknowledged in the text) and one figure; no subheadings should be used and there should not be an abstract. If the article describes a new variant, sources searched should be listed. And, multiple known variants in the same individual do not constitute a 'new' variant.

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Short report of clinical case illustrating a clinical and an anatomical point

**A Glimpse of our Past\***

Short article on an aspect of the history of anatomy

**Review\***

A comprehensive but critical analysis of a topic that includes perspectives of the past, present, and future, if applicable

**Viewpoint\***

Opinions or perspectives on clinical anatomy

**Problems in Diagnostic Imaging\***

Problem solving based on the interpretation of one or more high quality images

**Clinical Conundrum\***

Puzzling clinical presentations understood by their anatomical basis

**Topic for Debate\***

Discussion of controversial topics. Each "Topic" includes an invited lead paper and comments from three or four contributors of differing viewpoints. Suggestions for future topics and offers of contributions are welcomed by the editors.
